Dear Members and Friends,

After a long break due to the global pandemic, we finally resumed our face-to-face annual conferencing last year in Dubai, when we celebrated our Diamond Jubilee with the theme of "75 Years of Worldwide Public Opinion Research". We reviewed our history, highlighted the role and application of public opinion research in monitoring public opinion across the world, and addressed a number of relevant and timely issues. This year, we move on with the theme of "Public Opinion Research in a Technology-Driven World". WAPOR

grows with time. In between these two conferences, we have evolved a lot. Following the wish of our previous Council, we have reviewed and revised our Constitution. We have introduced organizational membership, increased the number of Council seats to ten, and turned all seats into elected posts. We have also sharpened the term of reference of many posts. All these are important developments in terms of representation. We are an organization constituted to let people's voices be heard, we practice what we preach.

WAPOR is a "World Association", so we shall not be limited by boundaries, whether geographical, ethnical, cultural, or epistemological. We will continue to break down language and cultural barriers, please keep supporting us.

Very recently, we subscribed to a new service provider for creating Listserv chat groups. We have already created six groups for members and representatives at different levels. Our objective is to promote free professional discussions among members on any topic, to encourage bottom-up initiatives in different domains of WAPOR development, and to extend it to non-members who may become members, like our students and co-workers. We will launch a "Friends of WAPOR" pilot scheme running up to the end of 2024, to engage them in our Listerv discussions, so as to widen our knowledge base and to expand our WAPOR community. I hope all members and friends of WAPOR will join hands to further our core values of Liberty, Quality and Humanity.

Ten months ago in Dubai, we reviewed our history. Now in Salzburg, we venture into the new world. Ten months later in Seoul, we will have a Joint Conference with a Regional Chapter, and we will continue to break more grounds. Knowledge grows exponentially. What we have achieved over the past 75 years may well be doubled in another 25 years, if we have the will. Let us make Salzburg a takeoff point in opening new frontiers. For that, on behalf of WAPOR, I must thank Paris Lodron University for providing us with such a wonderful venue to hold our conference, for us to marvel at our world's cultural heritage, and to do our best to preserve and enhance it.

WELCOME TO SALZBURG



Dear Public Opinion Researchers from Around the World,

In my role as the Local Conference Chair of the 76th WAPOR Conference, I am delighted to welcome all of you in our wonderful Austrian city of Salzburg, located in the heart of Europe. I have been active in cross-national survey research for many years, and this is the reason why I joined WAPOR last year when attending my first WAPOR Conference in Dubai. I was truly impressed by the great quality of the presentations, the diverse mix of scientists and practitioners, and the

global dialogue on quantitative methods and public opinion research. It is my hope that we can bring the same spirit to Salzburg this year and will succeed in fostering a perfect blend of academic discourse and Austrian hospitality.

I want to briefly present my university, which functions as the local hosting institution of this year's conference. In 2022, the Paris Lodron University of Salzburg (PLUS) celebrated its 400th anniversary of its founding by Prince Archbishop Paris Lodron as well as the 60th anniversary of its reconstitution in 1962. Despite its religious beginning, our university is now a public institution, with 2,800 employees and about 18,000 students, the University is the largest educational institution in the state of Salzburg. Last year we also underwent a reorganization of the university structure by creating six instead of four faculties. Most importantly for us as social scientists was the creation of a new Faculty of Social Sciences. Besides offering a broad spectrum of scientific disciplines from Theology and Law to the natural sciences as well as the cultural sciences, our current rectorate decided to give the digital and analytical sciences as well as the social sciences a higher value upgrading them to new faculties. The Department of Sociology and Human Geography is one of the main pillars of the new faculty of the Social Sciences. My Department of Sociology, which I represent as the Local Conference Chair, and which consists of dedicate faculty, external lecturers and administrative staff is responsible for educating more than 500 students ranging from the bachelor's to the doctorate level. Numerous publications and research projects reflect our commitment to high-quality quantitative methods and our leading position in survey research in the University of Salzburg and beyond. Therefore, organizing the 76th WAPOR conference about "Public Opinion Research in a Technology-Driven World" is a perfect opportunity for us to strengthen our collaborative work across our departments engaged in public opinion research and to present our university to the global WAPOR community.

Our conference takes place in our new university building at Unipark Nonntal, — the name "Valley of Nuns" refers to the nunnery sitting atop the hill across from this building and is a reminder of Salzburg's ecclesiastical heritage. This newer university building is an ideal venue for a conference of this size and located just a short distance from the city center. I really want to thank the University of Salzburg in general and the Unipark Nonntal in particular for all the tremendous support in making this conference a success. First and foremost, I need to express my gratitude to all the dedicated staff members at this venue who have helped to arrange everything so perfectly for us. All rooms featuring the parallel session are located in the gallery on the first floor (one floor up the staircase), where we will also have our coffee breaks and our poster sessions. All pre-organized panels and keynotes will be organized at the ground floor with enough space for all participants. And in the basement, there is additional space for lunch and for socializing during breaks.

On Tuesday September 19th, our first conference day, we will provide a great mixture of workshops and methods training. We officially start the conference with a terrific opening ceremony (including the first keynote by Claes de Vreese from the University of Amsterdam). And we will end the day with a Welcome Reception on the rooftop terrace with a 360-degree

view of Salzburg. The only thing left to hope for here is that the weather cooperates, and the notorious Salzburg rain will stay far away.

During three conference days we will have two further keynote speeches. The second one will be on Wednesday by Frauke Kreuter (the Chair of Statistics and Data Science at LMU Munich) and the last one during the closing ceremony on Friday by Reinhard Heinisch who is the head of the Political Science Department at our university. Various parallel sessions and preorganized panels will be focusing on the impact of rapidly accelerating technologies on public opinion research, including its effects on our methodology. We will confront questions of misinformation, campaigning, and its effects on voting behaviour. And we will learn a lot about the potentials and limits of big data technologies, non-probability sampling or artificial intelligence in our field.

Besides intense conference days, we all hope that you have some time to explore the city of Salzburg, a UNESCO-designated World Heritage site, that is renowned for its baroque architecture and, of course, also famous for being the birthplace of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. In the early evening, we offer guided city tours so that you can visit the highlights of Salzburg and its history. We offer boat trips so that you may also experience the beautiful views of the town from the Salzach river. And in the evening, we will together sample local Salzburg dishes in the nice traditional restaurant "Sternbräu" directly in the city center, if you like. On Thursday evening we will bring you all to the Fortress of Hohensalzburg for our conference dinner and the awards ceremony. We hope that this conference highlight will be a truly memorable experience for everyone. I hope WAPOR 2023 in Salzburg will stay in your mind as a wonderful meeting place and of us as good hosts.







Cross-cultural survey methodology – the benefits and pitfalls of multilevel-analysis

The course consists of two teaching units and one practical session and will give an introduction into the main challenges of cross-cultural survey methodology, and one commonly used statistical technique (multi-level analysis) for cross-national comparisons. In an introductory session I will deal with the specific challenges of cross-national survey research at different stages. We will refer to various levels of bias and will discuss certain guidelines to improve cross-cultural research. In the second session I will give an introduction to multilevel analysis and will discuss the potentials and limits of this method for cross-cultural research. We will also deal with one practical example (conducting a multilevel analysis with SPSS) to demonstrate how results can be obtained, illustrated, and interpreted with caution. The course represents a mixture of introducing the main issues of (cross-cultural) survey design and offering first insights and a critical understanding in multilevel analysis, which is a commonly used technique in cross-cultural survey research. The course aims at students and scholars from all disciplines and at all academic levels (Master students, Ph.D. students, post-doctoral researchers and academic staff). Basic knowledge in survey research and statistical techniques (such as regression analysis) is not required but is considered as useful to get the most out of the course.



Lecturer: Wolfgang Aschauer is currently working as Associate Professor at the Division of Sociology and Social Geography (Department of Sociology) at the University of Salzburg. His main research focus is on the contemporary challenges of social integration in Western societies. In his studies, he mainly adopts a quantitative perspective and is involved in several methodological sociological networks, including the International Sociological Association Research Committee 33 (ISA RC33), the European Survey Research Association (ESRA), and the European

Sociological Association Research Network 21 (ESA RN 21) and WAPOR (World Association of Public Opinion Research). Parts of his work are committed to the development of quantitative methods, specifically evidencing his cross-cultural expertise in the role of construct equivalence.

Factorial survey experiments for the study of opinions and intentions: potentials, pitfalls, evaluation

Factorial survey experiments (FSE) are increasingly used to study attitudes, opinions and intentions in survey-based research. The method allows for a direct empirical test of theoretical explanations, causal inference of treatment effects, and the investigation of potential effect heterogeneity across (sub)samples, while designs can be easily replicated. Therefore, FSE can serve as an enriching complement to conventional surveys on the one hand and to field experiments on the other. However, it is also important to be aware of the shortcomings of applications. In the training workshop, we aim to discuss the potentials and pitfalls of FSE-applications. For this purpose, the methodological core idea, basic construction principles and fields of application are discussed in a first step. Following on from that and using an example experiment, the possibilities and limits of FSE are outlined in relation to the internal validity, construct validity, and external validity of the obtained results. Potential threats to validity are illustrated for all essential study particulars: varied dimensions and levels, respondent sample, randomisation, survey mode, and data analyses. By this way, some general guidelines for using FSE in survey-based opinion research are provided. Finally, we will practically train to build up an experimental design using own example questions and to critically interpret results of an example analysis. The workshop is designed as an introductory course for interested researchers of all academic levels who want to get an overview of the method or who plan to use FSE in their own research. Basic knowledge of survey designs, practical data analysis and issues of causal inference is an advantage.



Lecturer: Knut Petzold is currently working as a Professor of Methods of Empirical Social Research at Zittau/Goerlitz University of Applied Sciences and as a Visiting Professor at the Department of Sociology and Human Geography of the Paris Lodron University Salzburg. His expertise lies in the application of experimental designs the social sciences, while he is generally interested in theory-driven approaches and contemporary methods of causal inference. He holds a doctoral degree from the University of Leipzig and received a postdoctoral graduation from

the Catholic University of Eichstätt-Ingolstadt. He also takes active roles in the European Sociological Association (ESA RN 21), the European Survey Research Association (ESRA), and the German Sociological Association (DGS).

Survey Quality Predictor 3.0 – A Tool for Quantifying the Quality of Survey Questions

The Survey Quality Predictor (SQP) is an open-access software for predicting the quality of survey questions. It is also a database and search engine for survey questions and information on their quality. SQP has three main areas of application: (1) questionnaire development (i.e., SQP can be used to design, evaluate, and improve new questions), (2) translation checks (i.e., SQP can be used to control for deviations in translations in cross-country or multilingual studies), and (3) correction of measurement error (i.e., the quality estimates of SQP can be used to correct for measurement error in substantive analyses). In the first part of the workshop, how the quality of survey questions can be predicted, how this is implemented in SQP, and how SQP can be applied in the research process are explained. The second part of the workshop will be more hands-on, and participants will get to know the software in more detail.



Lecturer: Lydia Repke studied *Political and Administrative Sciences* at the University of Konstanz, Germany, and did a research stay at Boğaziçi Üniversitesi in Istanbul, Turkey. She graduated from the double master's degree program *European Master in Government* of the University of Konstanz and Universitat Pompeu Fabra, Spain, where she received her doctor's degree in cultural psychology (2017) and the Special Doctorate Award 2017 for her doctoral thesis. Since 2012 she has been a member of the Research and Expertise Centre for Survey Methodology in Barcelona, Spain, and since 2018 she has been working for GESIS – Leibniz Institute

for the Social Sciences in the Department of Survey Design and Methodology in Mannheim, Germany, and is the manager of the Survey Quality Predictor 3.0. From 2018 to 2021, Lydia Repke served as spokesperson for the Leibniz PostDoc Network. In 2020, she was accepted into the Young Academy of the Academy of Sciences and Literature, Mainz and was part of the speaker team from 2022 to 2023. In October 2022, she was elected to the board of the "Sociological Network Research" Section of the German Sociological Association (German: Deutsche Gesellschaft für Soziologie, DGS).

Measurement Invariance in Comparative Social Research

Comparing the evolution and constitution of social phenomena across social contexts, groups or time has a long tradition in social science research. It allows to study, how the contextual or temporal conditions affect the individuals exposed to these conditions and social life as a whole. Often, the theoretical constructs subject to comparisons are not directly observable (e.g., value orientations, attitudes, beliefs, motivations). Rather, they are conceptualized as latent constructs, measured by a set of observed indicators.

Valid comparisons of latent constructs require construct equivalence and equivalent measurements. In this workshop, we first discuss these concepts and their connection from an epistemological perspective. Then, we focus on measurement invariance as a framework for conceptualizing measurement equivalence. We deal with the consequences of noninvariance for comparisons and how measurement invariance can be empirically assessed by means of confirmatory factor analysis. The workshop ends with a brief description of existing analytical options if exact measurement invariance cannot be obtained. Please note that practical statistical software applications for participants are not provided due to time constraints.

The workshop is designed as a *first introduction* for students/researchers who (intend to) work with survey data; *start* doing comparative research; are interested in comparing latent constructs and their associations. Participants are assumed to be familiar with the linear regression model and to have at least basic knowledge in confirmatory factor analysis and structural equation modelling. Participants do not need prior knowledge about the methodology of comparisons.



Lecturer: Heinz Leitgöb is an Interim Professor at the Institute of Sociology, Leipzig University, Germany and senior researcher at the Institute of Sociology, University of Frankfurt, Germany. He chairs the methods section of the German Sociological Association and the European Working Group on Quantitative Methods in Criminology of the European Society of Criminology. He is also an editor of the European Association of Methodology Book Series at Routledge. His research interests cover the topics of measurement invariance, survey mode effects,

digitalization of social research methods, and criminal behaviour.

Assessment of Survey Data Quality

Assessing the quality of survey data is crucial for ensuring accurate and reliable research findings. This workshop aims to provide participants with a comprehensive understanding of survey biases, their indicators, and strategies to identify and mitigate them. Additionally, the workshop will delve into essential concepts such as response styles, the design effect, and the distinction between nonprobability and probability samples. The workshop will begin by introducing participants to the fundamental concepts of survey biases. Biases can arise due to various factors, such as sampling errors, non-response, question wording, and respondent characteristics. By understanding these biases, researchers can enhance the validity and generalizability of their survey results. The first significant aspect to be covered in this workshop is the identification of survey quality indicators. Participants will learn about common indicators and gain practical knowledge and tools to detect biases in survey data, enabling them to evaluate the quality of their data accurately. This will be followed up by a discussion of survey design effects on data quality. The design effect accounts for the complex survey designs and clustering effects, which can lead to higher sampling variances. Participants will gain insights into calculating the design effect and its implications for statistical analyses. Afterwards the final part of the workshop will cover response styles. Participants will explore different response styles, including acquiescence, extreme response, and midpoint tendency. Understanding response styles is crucial for discerning if respondents are answering questions honestly or exhibiting systematic response patterns. Participants will learn techniques to identify and control for these response styles, thus minimizing their impact on reported survey results and interpretations. During the whole workshop participants will get information on how to deal with such aspects when using non-probability and probability samples. This central theme of the workshop will allow participants to explore the strengths and limitations of each sampling approach and understand how it influences the generalizability and representativeness of survey findings. By the end of this workshop, participants will possess a solid foundation in survey data quality assessment. They will have the knowledge and skills necessary to identify and mitigate biases, understand response styles, calculate the design effect, and make informed decisions regarding sampling strategies. This workshop aims to equip researchers with the tools they need to ensure the reliability and validity of their survey research. Practical examples and case studies will be utilized to illustrate the implications of sample design choices on survey data quality. Basic knowledge of R (accessing datasets, generating tables, recoding variables) and basic knowledge of the Total Survey Error framework is required.



Lecturer: Dimitri Prandner's current research agenda deals with the quality of survey data (e.g. total survey error; especially interviewer effects as well as application scenarios for data imputation) and how process-generated data ("big data") relates to traditional survey data. This research is conducted in a joint-partnership of AUSSDA – the Austrian Social Science Data Archive and the department of sociology at the Johannes Kepler University of Linz. When it comes to substantive topics, Dimitri Prandner works at the intersection of political sociology (especially political efficacy and political attitudes) and journalism studies, using an approach

that builds upon Bourdieu's field theory as well as models based on Durkheim's writings. His teaching is specialized on social science research methods and statistics for social scientist. He was awarded with the 2020 ARS DOCENDI – the Austrian national price for higher education teaching – for research-oriented teaching. Currently he is the speaker for the sociological research designs and methods section of the Austrian Sociological Association.



Lecturer: Alexander Seymer teaches statistics and research methods at the University of Salzburg and the Paracelsus Medical University Salzburg. His research interests include the association of personal values and public opinion primarily but not exclusively in the context of welfare states, statistics with a focus on latent variable modelling and everything related to R. Besides his attention to quantitative comparative social science research, his genuine and general interest in statistics led to collaborations with scholars from other disciplines during the last years. He received his Diploma in Sociology from the University of Leipzig and continued his studies in the International Master programme in Social Policy Analysis by Catholic

University Leuven, Luxembourg and Associate Institutes. After studying seven years at universities and research institutes, he decided to apply his knowledge in the context of politics working three years in Brussels. Two of the three years, he dedicated his efforts as assistant to a Member of the European Parliament. Eager to integrate his work and academic experiences, he started his PhD at the Salzburg Centre for European Union Studies at the University of Salzburg. He is currently working at the Department of Political Science and Sociology.

Fundamentals and Best Practices of Administrative Records for Survey Methodology

Administrative records have long been regarded as a way of supplementing and improving the quality and interpretability of surveys and censuses. Using bing administrative records helps control the rising cost of survey data collection and improve data quality. This workshop will present fundamental issues of understanding administrative data and integrating them with sample surveys and censuses to provide information essential to decision-making. The workshop will turn to present best practices and cutting-edge research on the use of administrative records over the survey life cycle, integrating with surveys, censuses, and auxiliary data. Real-world examples, as assembled across the Atlantic and the Pacific, of linking administrative records to household, economic and health surveys will address how administrative data can be used to improve the survey frame, reduce nonresponse errors, and assess coverage error, among others.

The workshop is intended to provide a review of foundation and the current state of the field in administrative records research and applications by leveraging a framework of "total administrative records error" and "total linked data error". As such, the workshop will provide an overview and assessment of methodological issues involved in the collection and analysis of administrative records, such as data quality, cost, and data linking methodology. The workshop will illustrate how administrative data can be transformed into information that is useful and relevant to evidence-based decision making in key sectors of health, economy, and education so they may answer questions that cannot be answered by relying on traditional surveys alone.

The target audience ranges from users and producers of administrative records to researchers in academia, government, and industry. The workshop will be equally useful to students of data science, big data, and survey methodology. The workshop should be of interest and benefit to practitioners of survey methodology, given the escalating use of administrative records in almost every discipline. I will use "Administrative Records for Survey Methodology" (2021, Chun et al.) as a primary reference for the Workshop. The book featuring leading scholars of administrative data across the Atlantic addresses the following topics: theory and fundamentals of administrative data research and application, quality of administrative data, administrative data processing and linking methodology, statistical use of administrative data in sample surveys and censuses, and real-world applications of administrative data to inform evidence-based policy making.



Lecturer: Dr. Asaph Young Chun is a seasoned research director, interdisciplinary research scientist, and survey methodologist dedicated to data innovation, survey methodology, and data science over 30 years. Young led a number of governmental and academic institutions by taking various research positions, including Director-General of the Statistics Research Institute, a state-run data think tank of the Korean government; Research Chief for Decennial Directorate at the U.S. Census Bureau; Senior Survey Methodologist at NORC at the University of

Chicago; and Senior Research Scientist at the American Institutes for Research. His areas of research are devoted to administrative records, responsive and adaptive design, nonresponse, and evidence-based decision making. He is currently leading interdisciplinary research for future pandemics at the Seoul National University, South Korea, and providing expert consultations to governments, survey institutions, and academic organizations across the world.



Eagle's Nest TOUR

Passing the old baroque city of Salzburg and crossing the German border, the tour takes you straight into the Alps to our first stop the Obersalzberg. Reserved special busses - fitted with special engines and brakes – will take you on a most spectacular 6.5 km long single lane road blasted out of solid rock with a 22% gradient up to the Eagle's Nest, 1.820 meters. To reach Hitler's former residence you enter a 124 meters long tunnel into the mountain where a golden brass elevator will take you another 124 meters up into the building itself. Construction of the Eagle's Nest with its metre-thick foundation walls was finished after only 13 months in 1938 and considered as one of the most elaborate construction projects during the Third Reich. After touring the historical building including the famous fire place room, enjoy a breathtaking panoramic view of the Bavarian and Austrian Alps. Yet, as impressive the building may be, it still stands for the insanity of regime where plans for war and mass murder were formed.

Lakes and Mountains TOUR

Join us on our trip to the romantic Lake District Salzkammergut, where Salzburgs Prince Archbishops held royal hunts and the Austrian Emperor Franz Joseph and his family spent their summer vacations. The tour will leave Salzburg and pass by Lake Fuschl with castle Fuschl, now a five-star hotel, on its shores. Explore the little town of St. Gilgen, where Mozart's mother was born and enjoy a 45-minute boat ride to St. Wolfgang. At St. Wolfgang your guide will show you the famous pilgrimage church with its carved gothic winged altar by Michael Pacher. There will be some time to explore the picturesque town or have a coffee break on the terrace of the famous White Horse Inn (Weisses Rössl) – We continue our journey along the Krottensee with castle Hüttenstein and drive along Lake Mondsee before we return to Salzburg.
