This year WAPOR is reaching another milestone in its history and celebrates 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary since the establishment of the Association back in 1947. At this year's conference we highlight the role and application of survey research in monitoring public opinion across the world since the end of WWII. This period has witnessed continuous and ongoing innovations in the conduct, analysis and interpretation of public opinion research, and this information is routinely disseminated across the globe. Featured panels are organized to address important themes such as public opinion research in conflict zones and in times of war, challenges of comparative research in international survey projects, and effectively communicating public opinion to policy makers. The opening plenary session will feature two special panels where we will embark on a historical journey to track back the first 75 years of WAPOR history on one hand, and to look ahead at the prospects for the next 75 years of public opinion research. Other remarkable events at this year's conference include first presentation of the ESOMAR-WAPOR 2022 Freedom report and launch of the WAPOR new Regional Chapter in Sub-Saharan Africa.

This year becomes another turning point in the WAPOR history as for the first time WAPOR conference is taking place in the Gulf. A number of conference panels are organized by the local scholars to address important aspects of public opinion research in the UAE, including public opinion research and public policy, advocating SDG16 and the role of institutions, measuring culture through statistical indicators and other. Furthermore, to get acquainted with the local culture, the conference welcome reception will feature an exciting Safari Adventure and barbecue in the desert. We welcome your participation as we meet in person for the first time since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic to reflect on our history and look forward into the future.

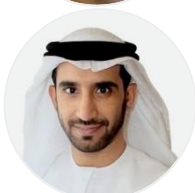
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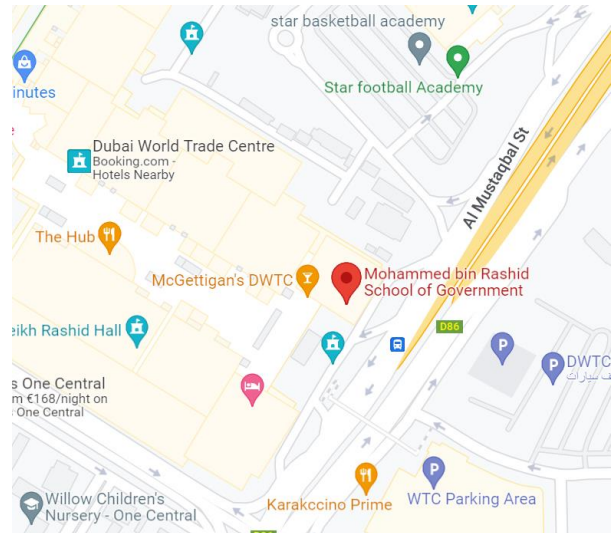

### Administrative Records for Survey Methodology – Part 1: Fundamentals of Administrative Records in Survey Methodology (Level: fundamental)

Administrative records have long been regarded as a way of supplementing and improving the quality and interpretability of surveys and censuses. Using administrative records helps control the rising cost of survey data collection and improve data quality. In the Workshop Part 1, I will address fundamental issues of understanding administrative data and integrating them with sample surveys and censuses to provide information essential to decision-making. The workshop is intended to provide a review of foundation and the current state of the field in administrative records research and applications by leveraging a framework of "total administrative records error" and "total linked data error". As such, the workshop will provide an overview and assessment of methodological issues involved in the collection and analysis of administrative records, such as data quality, cost, and data linking methodology.

### Administrative Records for Survey Methodology – Part 2: Best Practices of Applying Administrative Data to Survey Methodology (Level: advanced)

The Workshop Part 2 will present best practices and cutting-edge research on the use of administrative records over the survey life cycle, integrating with surveys, censuses, and auxiliary data. Best practices are assembled across the Atlantic. Real-world examples of linking administrative records to household, economic and health surveys will address how administrative data can be used to improve the survey frame, reduce nonresponse errors, and assess coverage error, among others. Other examples will illustrate how administrative data can be transformed into information that is useful and relevant to evidence-based decision making in key sectors of health, economy, and education so they may answer questions that cannot be answered by relying on traditional surveys alone.



**Professor Asaph Young Chun (South Korea)**, PhD, is Director-General 2019-2022, Statistics Research Institute at Statistics Korea. He is seasoned research director, interdisciplinary research scientist, and survey methodologist dedicated to data innovations, survey methodology, and data science over 30 years. His areas of research are devoted to administrative records, responsive and adaptive design, nonresponse, and evidence-based decision making.



## **Survey Quality Predictor 3.0 – A Tool for Quantifying the Quality of Survey Questions (Level: advanced)**

The Survey Quality Predictor (SQP) is an open-access software for predicting the quality of survey questions. It is also a database and search engine for survey questions and information on their quality. SQP has three main areas of application: (1) questionnaire development (i.e., SQP can be used to design, evaluate, and improve new questions), (2) translation checks (i.e., SQP can be used to control for deviations in translations in cross-country or multilingual studies), and (3) correction of measurement error (i.e., the quality estimates of SQP can be used to correct for measurement error in substantive analyses). In the first part of the workshop, how the quality of survey questions can be predicted, how this is implemented in SQP, and how SQP can be applied in the research process are explained. The second part of the workshop will be more hands-on, and participants will get to know the software in more detail.



**Dr Lydia Repke (Germany)**, PhD, studied Political and Administrative Sciences at the University of Konstanz, Germany. Since 2012 she has been a member of the Research and Expertise Centre for Survey Methodology in Barcelona, Spain, and since 2018 she has been working for GESIS - Leibniz Institute for the Social Sciences in the Department of Survey Design and Methodology in Mannheim, Germany.

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## **Probability and Non-probability Social Surveys: Advantages, Suitability and Limitations (Level: fundamental)**

The main objective of the workshop is to provide participants with a brief overview of the history, theoretical foundations and empirical evidence surrounding the debate about probability and nonprobability sample surveys. We will discuss real-life examples to demonstrate that choice of sampling approach is of crucial importance. The workshop will provide participants with an understanding of the conditions under which probability and nonprobability samples can provide useful data to answer various research questions. We will also discuss the advantages and limitations of different approaches to probability and nonprobability sampling.



**Dr. Olga Maslovskaya (UK)**, PhD, is an Associate Professor in Survey Research and Social Statistics at the University of Southampton. She is a Survey Methodologist with an interest in all aspects of survey and a special interest in data quality and survey data collection. She is a Principal Investigator (PI) of the Survey Data Collection Network (SDC-Net) which investigates impact of covid-19 on survey data collection.

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## **Communicating public opinion data to policy makers (Level: advanced)**

This workshop will focus on strategies and best practices for effectively communicating public opinion and other survey data to policy makers. This is a critical problem that has been confronted by public opinion researchers across the world. The workshop will be of assistance to governments and employers' and workers' organizations in developing evidence-informed policy making. The workshop will provide guidelines for policymakers and researchers on knowledge translation products and will help establishing and nurturing critical links and collaborations between policymakers and researchers. The workshop will strengthen capacity press tracing and capacity to develop knowledge translation products (policy brief) and engage in uptake activities to support evidence-informed policymaking process.



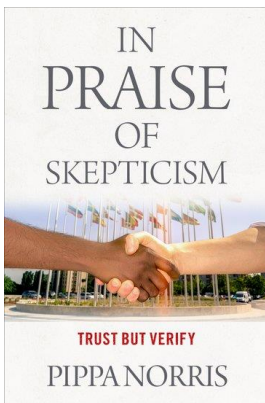

### IN PRAISE OF SKEPTICISM: TRUST BUT VERIFY



Trust is conventionally believed to have many beneficial consequences for citizens and societies - by lubricating markets, managing organizations, legitimating governments, and facilitating collective action. Any signs of its decline are, and should be, a matter of serious concern. Yet, Pippa Norris' [In Praise of Skepticism](#) questions the prevalent assumptions underpinning modern accounts of trust and recognizes that trust has two faces. Norris unpacks the concept and advances a new four-fold typology based on the interplay of trust and trustworthiness, where trust by principals is compared with indicators of the competency, integrity, and impartiality of governments.

Trustworthiness involves an informal social contract by which principals authorize agents to act on their behalf in the expectation that they will fulfill their responsibilities with competency, integrity, and impartiality, despite conditions of risk and uncertainty. We should trust but verify. Skeptical judgments reflect reasonably accurate and informed predictions about agents' future actions based

on their past performance and guardrails deterring dishonesty, mendacity, and corruption. Both cynical beliefs (underestimating performance) and credulous faith (over-estimating performance) involve erroneous judgements reflecting cultural biases, poor cognitive skills, and information echo chambers. Drawing on new evidence from the [European Values Survey/ World Values Survey](#) conducted in more than 100 societies around the world, Norris concludes that as well as excessive cynicism, the risks arising from too much credulous trust by citizens towards authorities are commonly underestimated (the book can be [ordered online at www.oup.com](#) with promotion code ASFLYQ6).

### Pippa Norris (Harvard University, USA)



[Pippa Norris](#) is a comparative political scientist who has taught at Harvard for three decades. She is the Paul F. McGuire Lecturer in Comparative Politics at the [John F. Kennedy School of Government](#), Harvard University, and Founding Director of the [Electoral Integrity Project](#), Director of the [Global Party Survey](#), Co-Director of the [TrustGov Project](#) and Vice-President of the [World Values Survey](#). Her research compares public opinion and elections, political institutions and cultures, gender politics, and political communications in many countries worldwide. She is ranked the 2nd most cited political scientist worldwide, according to [Google scholar](#).

Major career honors include, amongst others, the [Skytte prize](#), IPSA's [Karl Deutsch](#) award, fellowship of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, APSA's Charles Merriam award, APSA's Warren E. Miller award, and APSA's [Samuel Eldersfeld lifetime achievement award](#), and the PSA's [Sir Isaiah Berlin](#) award, as well as several book awards and honorary doctorates. Publications in 2019 include books on [Electoral Integrity in America](#) for OUP and [Cultural Backlash](#) for CUP. ### DEMOCRATIC BACKSLIDING AND THREATS TO DEMOCRACY: EVIDENCE FROM THE ARAB BAROMETER

In 2011, citizens across the Middle East took to the streets to demand more representative governments, social justice, and economic reforms. Within just a few years, however, hope had mostly given way to despair: the old order came roaring back—even more repressive than before in some places. That outcome, however, did not settle the underlying question of the future of democracy in the Middle East. Not only have authoritarians further consolidated their rule, but even more important, attitudes toward democracy and political rights have dramatically shifted.

Results from [Arab Barometer](#) help understand how views toward democracy have shifted. Most of the people who took to the streets in 2011 were motivated not just by a desire for liberty but also by intense frustration with the material conditions of their lives. The protesters were tired of political repression, but they were also deeply angry about the meager opportunities that authoritarian systems afforded. Reviewing these changes and how the outcomes of the last decade have largely disappointed, the results from Arab Barometer can help elucidate where the region is headed and the possible political changes in the post-COVID era across the Middle East and North Africa.

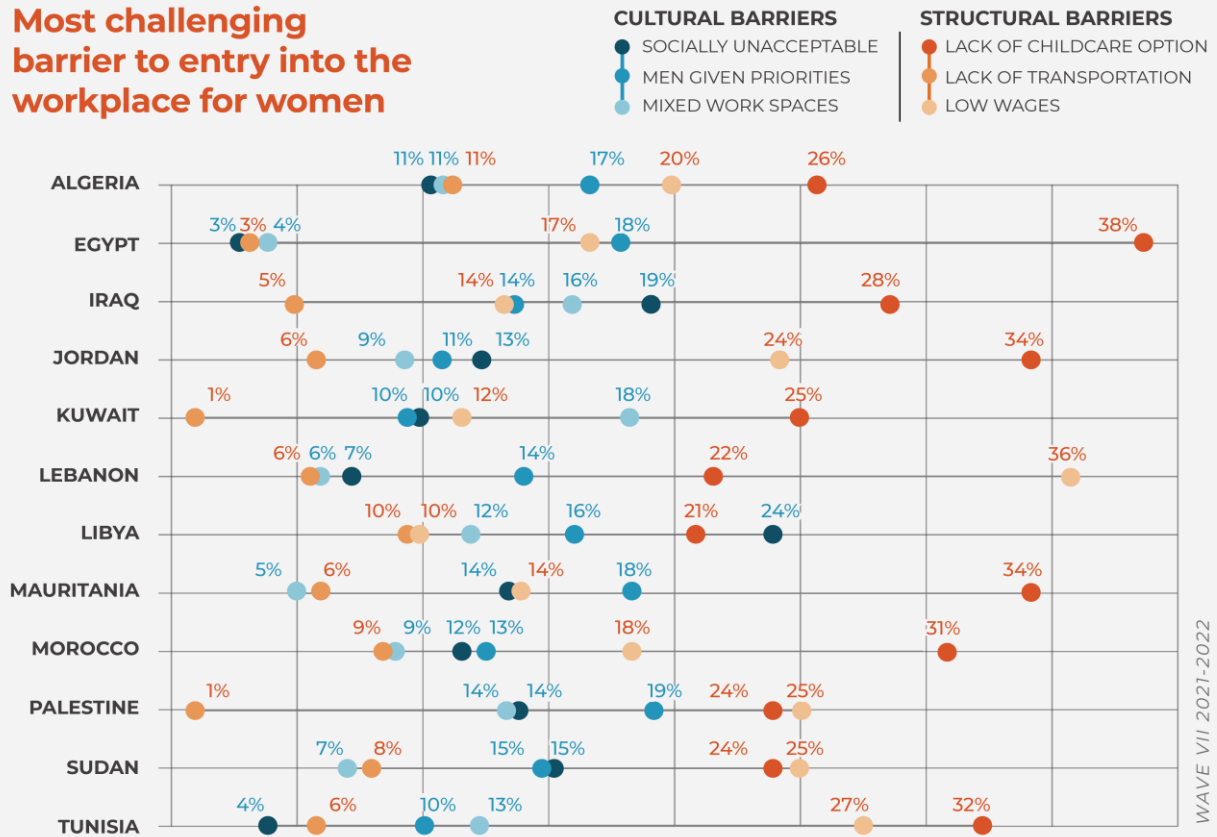
#### Amaney Jamal (Princeton University, USA)



[Amaney A. Jamal](#) is Dean of the Princeton School of Public and International Affairs, Edwards S. Sanford Professor of Politics, and Professor of Politics and International Affairs at Princeton University. Jamal also directs the Workshop on Arab Political Development and the Bobst-American University of Beirut Collaborative Initiative. Jamal is the co-Principal of the [Arab Barometer](#) Project (Winner of the Best Dataset in the Field of Comparative Politics (Lijphart/Przeworski/Verba Dataset Award 2010). Her book, [Barriers to Democracy \(2007\)](#), which explores the role of civic associations in promoting democratic effects in the Arab world, won the 2008 American Political Science Best Book Award in the Comparative Democratization section. Her other

books include, *Of Empires and Citizens* and her co-edited volume *Arab Americans Before and After 9/11*. Jamal's articles have appeared in the *American Journal of Political Science*, *Journal of Politics*, *Comparative Political Studies*, *Journal of Conflict Resolution*, *Comparative Politics*, *Perspectives on Politics*, *International Migration Review*, and other venues. Her article "Does Islam Play a Role in anti-Immigrant Sentiment: An Experimental Approach.", in *Social Science Research* 2015 won the 2016 Louis Wirth Best Article Award: American Sociological Association, International Migration Section. Her areas of specialization are the Middle East and North Africa, mass and political behaviour, political development and democratization, inequality and economic segregation, Muslim Immigration (US and Europe), gender, race, religion, and class.

We are the longest-standing and the largest repository of publicly available data on the views of men and women in the MENA region.

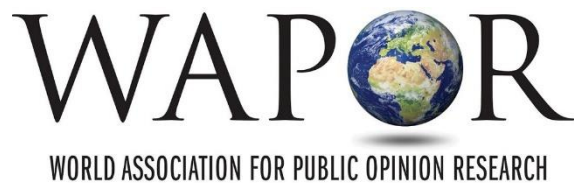
